
if someone traveling through towns and knows an OF lives in the area if we gave them a call just to see how they are.



Forgotten Australians and Former Child Migrants Oral History Project

As the Prime Minister announced in his apology on 16 November 2009, the National Library has conducted an oral history project to record the lives and experiences of Forgotten Australians and Former Child Migrants. Interviews were conducted across Australia, will be preserved in the National Library and made publicly available, subject to any access conditions imposed by interviewees.

Several Old Fairbridgians are included in this project and after having listened to their interviews President Derek recommends anyone interested to Google in the project title; Forgotten Australians and Former Child Migrants Oral History Project. The results will take you to a library webpage that describes the project. This page will also provide other links to the project and the interviews.

Most of the interviews are around one hour long and by following the links they can be listened to online, or in some cases just a written transcript of the interview is available. Well worth checking out.



I have entered this as a comment somewhere in Fairbridge tales but that is not going to get the message across except to the limited number who will go to the trouble of trolling thru that section, and I do believe that the comments I have made are worthy of consideration even if to add just a little balance to the negativity of much that is being said.(In and about the class action) I say here as in my letter later on, I acknowledge there were errors, but no man alive stands clear under the microscopic attention of those of one view only.

"I know that not all was as it may have been at Fairbridge, with the benefit of hindsight, but as I read some of the accounts making much of the more negative aspects of the situation , I am often at a loss when I see recorded things of which I had no knowledge although I was resident there from 1948-1954. For example, I never to the best of my knowledge witnessed children 5 years old cutting wood, in my day children of that age raked paths, collected chips for example and worked with a senior boy about

the cottage. Woodsey would have never have allowed a kid of that age to use an axe. We certainly never rose at 2.30 am to get the cows in, and when we did wake we certainly had no trouble rising from our pillows, we didn't have any, our cyclone wire steel framed beds had a raised end supposedly to negate the need for pillows, that however never caused us any trauma. I don't deny the certainty of swift punishment was great incentive to "get it right" but the over all results speak for themselves, the vast majority learnt the basic lessons of life, and they have equipped most of us to survive in a world that I found was far more hostile and, predatory and unforgiving than Fairbridge ever was. I would like also to comment on a statement in the solicitors report that "many children left Fairbridge unable to read or write". I cannot prove differently, however it sounds to me like a gross exaggeration to use the expression "many". I know few of us were "brains", just a few, but I didn't know any one in the six years I was there who could not read or write. With regard to the legal action being taken, if this can of worms is opened there will be no stopping the unwarranted damage that may be done to the reputation of the many that were good honest people albeit poorly suited to the task, none of whom would be around to defend their reputation against the allegations made against them. Abuse of children is and always will be a terrible part of human nature Stop and consider that not all the perpetrators of abuse at Fairbridge were management or staff, there was much that occurred that the hierarchy could never know about because the victims would never give the perpetrators up. We may well find some of our own acquaintances caught in the outfall.

So why don't I support the action apart from the points already mentioned. To be absolutely honest it was a tough place, and as I said earlier there were things done that by today's standards are wrong, The fact is that most of those guilty are dead. What can be given to those who feel hurt and offended to heal them? No amount of "sorries" or" monetary compensation", nothing can heal the hurt. A wise man once said, "The only result of looking back over your shoulder is a terribly sore neck" You cannot repair the past, yesterday is gone, our duty as far as we are able, is to make sure the past does not repeat itself.

We took them to Griffith Airport for their departure back to Sydney, then onto England.



From the formation of the OFA on Sunday the 7th of January 1940 to 1965 our Association had what can only be described as a very chequered history; irregular meetings, very little recorded history and a general lack of interest in the continuation of activities. This was contributed to by World War 2 and younger Fairbridgians establishing their futures and working commitments.

In 1965 a group of Old Fairbridgians met in Sydney with a view to setting our organisation on

a more permanent footing. A working group agreed to guide activities to bring about this most desirable situation. Laurence A. Field was one of this group and accepted the responsibility of controlling and recording all monetary activities.

On the 26th of January 1966 an official meeting was held at Fairbridge where the foundations of our current organisation were established.


Laurie was appointed Treasurer, a position he has held until today.





Times were still tough in Britain after the war this was 1950 and she found she couldn't look after the children properly so she allowed them to be sent out to the Fairbridge in W.A. the place where she grew up

Patricia was at the farm until she was 16 and she believes it was a lot better than the alternative of being in a home over in England or just roaming the streets as many kids did in the crowded parts of Britain.

Patricia did manage to re-unite with her mother a few times over in England. Fairbridge village is now run by a private company, Fairbridge Inc. They have many activities there including a huge Folk Festival this weekend. Anyone interested in going over in July let me know maybe we can arrange to go together.
